



Popular: 'The First Skyscraper' Controversy

Buffington 1888: Patent infringement

Chicago: Burnham, Jenney build the first-skyscraper case

Committees 1931: Investigated wreckage while demolished⁶

Condit 1952 was '... the first true skyscraper ...'

Condit 1964 was '... the major progenitor of the first true skyscraper ...'

Condit 1988: 'We can no longer argue that the HIB was the first skyscraper.'

Leslie 2013: 'only a small improvement over the Leiter' 'a crucial step away from the skeletal formula'

Barr 2024: 'well established among ... historians that WLB Jenney did not invent the skyscraper'
